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#### World Parliament of Religions 1893/1993

In her book, The New Church in the New World, Marguerite Block quotes an eye-witness account of the final night of the Parliament in 1893 when its chief organiser, the prominent Chicago New-Churchman Charles Carroll Bonney was "hailed and cheered by the vast audience rising to their feet and waving their handkerchiefs, so that it was long before he could utter his words of humble and sincere acknowledgment and gratitude." We are reminded that there have been these occasions when Swedenborg's writings have had an undisputed impact on people's thinking. Professor Eric Sharpe, Department of Religious Studies at Sydney University, described the Parliament as "an event of the utmost importance in the religious history of the modern world."

The man who started the movement towards a centennial parliament to be held *next* year, 1993, Swami Sarveshananda is determined that there shall be a prominent Swedenborgian involvement "because we owe you so much." During the past 200 years there have been brilliant initiatives in education and religious tolerance based on Swedenborg but they have fizzled out or been hi-jacked by others. Swedenborg taught that all can be saved, whatever their religion. Had this never been heard before - was it a unique insight?

#### All the faiths of mankind

A hundred years ago the United States was preparing for the *four* hundredth anniversary of the 'discovery' of America. The centre-piece was the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago and the World Parliament of Religions was closely associated with it. The USA was well into pluralism as compared with Europe.

The size of the Parliament was 'mind-blowing - a General Schwartzkof was needed to organise it. Christian orthodoxy is said to have been mistrustful, yet it sent some of its leading scholars. There were 400 representatives - "cardinals, archbishops, bishops, priests and scholars of all the faiths of mankind." It opened on September 11th, 1893, and ran for 17 days. Attendances between 4000 and 7000 were recorded, 150 papers were presented and many brief addresses. Taken together with some concurrent denominational expositions, it is said that 6000 speakers at 12000 sessions addressed audiences which aggregated three-quarters of a million.

#### **Charles Carroll Bonney**

How did Charles Bonney carry it off? Did he play down the Swedenborg bit and sail under another flag? Ideas fieed to come at the right time and in the USA they took it up with gusto. But an idea from a Swedenborgian! Bonney possessed an unusual personality attracting affection and respect. He was a prominent lawyer, a social reformer, and in 1882 Vice-President of the American Bar Association. L.P. Mercer wrote of him "he had the ability to untangle and high-light the truth which lay behind every error and to lead people to see the simple universal truths which, when it comes to it, all religions are about."

In his opening address Bonney defined religion as "the love and worship of God, and the love and service of man." He possessed "gentleness, zeal, personal consideration, consummate tact and Christian politeness - ever ready to adopt the good and useful in an opposing suggestion."

#### The starting point

"It is of the Lord's divine providence that every nation has some form of religion, and the primary essential of every religion is the acknowledgment that there is a God" (Divine Providence paragraph 322). A beautiful picture of the Lord is encapsulated here. As the prophesy of Isaiah has it, "His arm is not shortened that it cannot save." He is not thwarted by all the diversity. With people of every culture something spiritual can be received. If people can resist being taken over by the self-serving side of their natures they can enjoy the blessing of heavenly life.

#### Universalism

How did Swedenborg get this idea? By revelation, we may say, but revelation tends not to be what I would call a 'bolt out of the blue' as if it had never been heard before: a climate develops beforehand. Universalism is discoverable from the early centuries of the Christian era. Origen (185-254 AD) believed that God is such that he is bound to save all. Look at the Roman Catholics: in 1302 the Pope declared "there is one holy, catholic, and apostolic church ... outside it there is neither salvation nor remission of sins." But at the Second Vatican Council, 1962-65 it was agreed that salvation is attainable by those who "through no fault of their own do not know the Gospel of Christ or his church, yet sincerely seek God and strive to do his will." You would not be blamed if you concluded that this was from Swedenborg.

John Hick, in his book God and the Universe of Faiths (1973), suggests that different religions represent different approaches by the one God reaching out to people of different circumstances - "we see how revelations took different forms related to the different mentalities of the peoples to whom they came, and developed ... into the world religions." This comes close to what Swedenborg wrote of Mohammedanism - a religion "adapted to the genius of the Orientals ... which should teach that the Lord came into the world and that he was a very great prophet, the wisest of all men, and the son of God."

To claim for Swedenborg an exclusive 'one-off' revelation is to ignore the humanism of the Renaissance which "espoused free enquiry and was sometimes tolerant of tentative gropings after truth even beyond the Christian fold." (The Reformation in the 16th century by Roland Bainton). We too easily see theological doom and gloom and an unbroken slide into falsity and darkness before Swedenborg. But examination reveals shafts of light, sanity and tolerance. An Italian refugee named Curio, a follower of the great humanist Erasmus, wrote that salvation could never be a matter of creeds, but of deeds; not dogma, but behaviour.

Swedenborg was in touch with such thinking, despite European tensions between tolerance and intolerance. He published in London and Amsterdam because of greater liberty there, and was himself a victim of bigotry. Despite some awful narrowness of thinking among Protestants and Roman Catholics, a liberal approach to the salvation of non-Christians persisted, of which Swedenborg was aware and by which he was influenced. What was revealed to Swedenborg required his warm endorsement.

#### What of 1993?

Under the heading Chicago Plans a Centennial, C. Rothwell Polk wrote as follows - "The legacy of the 1893 Parliament was a spirit of mutual respect and a commitment to inter-faith dialogue; but more than that, the mothers and fathers of the first Parliament left our age with an unfinished agenda: the unity of religions, the true one-ness of humankind, the emancipation of women, the harmony of science and religion, economic justice, planetary stewardship, and world peace; an agenda on whose resolution may well depend the survival of the human race."

Anything which opens up these issues is to be warmly applauded. There is to be some Swedenborgian involvement next year; we intend more. Let us see if we can come up with an approach suitable to our times.

#### A matter of interpretation

Perhaps we interpret Swedenborg too narrowly. We of the west read Swedenborg in a fairly predictable way. For example we are nervous about mystical experiences since we are products of a Protestant-dominated environment. Christianity is bigger than that. As interpreters of Swedenborg according to western theological traditions we have sometimes obscured the very things to which others might eagerly have responded.

Swedenborg leaves room for the visionary dimension and that is what has so appealed to eastern people who have not been prepared to set too narrow limits to what is, and what is not, rational.

Can we reclaim this visionary dimension, let go our orthodox definitions and stop labouring what is undoubtedly 'rational' and 'logical'? The situation is similar in eastern Europe with its long tradition of mysticism. Might it be possible, to mark the centennial, for us to publish in Hindi a new booklet about Swedenborg's visionary aspect for circulation in countries such as India?

#### The legacy

Bonney's 1893 World Parliament of Religions aimed at reconciliation, and concentrated on the essentials. We need such a vision today. Instead of fundamentalist certainty we need the humility that sees but one part of a large picture, and the affirmation that God works through different world faiths. Emanuel Swedenborg saw people in heaven from all religions united in their acknowledgment of the Lord and in service to one another. The thinking which influenced him in this world was confirmed by what he saw in the other. His writings brought it all into focus, and his followers from all over the religious world came "not to sink their differences but to share their treasures." (Eric Sharpe)

To start off this column, I was reading a couple of weeks ago volume 5 of the Arcana Caelestia par. 3854 (2) and (3) and I am still having my thoughts on it.

"The Lord saw from eternity what the human race was going to be like in the future and what every member of it was going to be like, and that evil was going to increase all the time, so that at length man, of himself, would rush headlong into hell.

That being so, the Lord has provided not only the means by which He makes it possible for him to be diverted from hell and led towards heaven, but also does in His providence divert and lead him all the time.

The Lord also foresaw that it would be impossible for any good to take root in man except in freedom, for that which does not take root in freedom is dispelled at the first sign of evil and of temptation .....

And since the Lord foresaw from eternity what man was going to be like in the future and even into eternity it is clear that Providence is present in the smallest individual things".

# *Experiences of Eternity*: Swedenborg and today.

As a celebration of Swedenborg's birthday on 29th January the Swedenborg Association of Australia Ltd. presented this talk by Professor John Wren Lewis on "Near Death Experiences" at The Swedenborg Centre, North Ryde to an audience of about 100 members and friends.

Professor John Wren Lewis, who was for 25 years a senior research scientist in Britain and later became a professor of religious studies in the U.S.A. now lives in Sydney in "retirement".

Since 1983, when he went through his own near death experience (NDE), John has been actively involved in NDE research. He lectures regularly and has had a number of articles published in a range of journals and magazines.

In his talk John presented the view that the study of NDE is really a study of the interaction of religion and science and that Swedenborg was the first scientist to be engaged in such studies without being persecuted to death in the process.

Of course the study of the world beyond the grave is people who have faced death (e.g. in war) can be correlated with NDE.

In 1980 a Galup poll in the U.S.A. found that 15% of the adult population had come back from the brink of death and 30% of that group reported to have had a very special experience.

As near-death is not death and thus the brain is still functioning, these experiences were dismissed by both the churches and academia as hallucinations being the after effects of anaesthetics, drugs or accident trauma.

A number of books have been written on the subject, just to name a few: Life after Life by Dr. Raymond Moody, Life at Death by Prof. Kenneth Ring (who will be in Sydney for a few days during August), Transformed by the Light" by Dr. Sherrie Sutherland.

John dealt in detail with the role that our imagination plays in these experiences making them highly individual and unique.

However there are 3 experiences common to all persons having had a NDE:

- 1. The experience is beyond description, a happiness and peace never experienced before.
- 2. A change of focus on life afterwards, a marked loss of anxiety particularly an absence of any fear of death.
- 3. Spiritual insights are increased and rigid or fundamentalist beliefs are no longer held.

In closing John gave a detailed account of his own NDE and in order to appreciate the depth of his experience as well as to obtain a good insight in the subject of NDE the purchase of an audio-tape of John's talk is recommended. (Available from The Swedenborg Centre, 1 Avon Road, North Ryde NSW 2113, members \$5.00, non-members \$8.00 plus postage.)

## Guest Speaker: Michael Stanley, M.Sc., Ph.D. from U.K.

Certainly a meeting not to be missed if it is at all possible to attend.

*Eve: The Bone of Contention* by Michael Stanley. Seminar Books. 1992. 92 pp, paper Members Price \$10.50 plus postage.

Will Schutz, who developed the now famous Encounter group therapy of the 1960's, has talked about a concept he termed "*profound simplicity*". The view is that as we approach something for the first time it may seem at first quite simple. This is the initial type of circulation control and a simplicity wherein we are simplicity, a sort of naive simplicity wherein we are operating more from an intellectual understanding rather than a more complete experience. An example I'd give is of when I first went to learn to play squash. I read a book by a squash master on the twelve easy steps to playing squash which was what seemed very basic instructions like "keep to the centre of the court, keep the ball low, keep the ball along the wall etc., etc." Well, that's pretty simple, I thought. Until I tried to actually play squash and become involved in the whole process. I quickly entered into what is the second stage of this process of understanding - things ain't quite as simple as they first seem! At this stage we experience the struggle and chaos of coming to grips with trying to actually *do* that which intellectually *looked* simple. However if we prevail and keep going we eventually reach a third stage of understanding built upon experience where we come out of the chaos and look and see that things are in fact simple - but now they are profoundly simple!

Now the reason I've taken this little digression on the way to a review of the book by Michael Stanley titled Eve: The Bone of Contention is that perhaps the most complimentary thing I can say about this book is that I find it to be profoundly simple. I was initially given this book as a gift with another that I was meant to review. I've ended up offering to review this book instead and haven't finished the other yet but found I've read and re-read this little book many times since!

In this book Michael Stanley presents a clear, simple interpretation of the story of Adam and Eve from a Swedenborgian perspective. He has integrated this perspective with current spiritual psychological theory and terminology, particularly the work of the Italian psychiatrist Roberto Assagioli. Added to this profoundly simple and moving interpretation of the Genesis story are beautifully simple and at times very humorous drawings and diagrams (I'll not digress to explain "beautiful" simplicity, but if you substitute art and music for "squash" and the heart for the head, then I think you'll get the feeling). My favourite diagram is the one which presents a pictorial representation of the ego busily enjoying it's new found intelligence. I found myself laughing spontaneously at the truth and humour therein!

At times I've tended, like us all, to judge a book by its cover and I must warn you that this book is most definitely one which contains much more than it first seems - it's a bit like a Doctor Who Tardis of books there's a lot more on the inside than you'd think from the outside. (Those of you who've never watched Dr. Who will need to know that he is a time traveller whose time machine was a British Telephone Box on the outside and a cavernous world inside). In fact to continue the time machine analogy further, this book transcends time and space in it's use of modern language to interpret what may at first seem to be a more ancient story at the beginning of humanity so that the reader feels what is being dealt with is very much a part of here and now - and so very relevant.

Well I've told you more about the book than what's actually in the book and that's in order that I don't take away the pleasure of reading this book for yourself. After all nobody likes to be told the ending to a good book!
