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EXPRESSIONS OF ORDER IN NATURE AND THE ARTS

Joe Vandermeer

(A synopsis of a talk given at the February 1995 Swedenborg Association meeting at The Swedenborg Centre, North Ryde. During this talk, Joe introduced many magnificent slides of expressions of art forms throughout history, from earliest times to modern, and from all parts of the world.)

This topic covers an enormous field! From simply looking at what art in itself is, how that relates to nature, how it derives from nature, and how order is expressed in both nature and the arts, enquiry is limitless.

When we speak of **Order** in the common sense of the word, the Macquarie Dictionary definition states that it is "a condition in which everything is in its proper place with reference to other things and to its purpose; methodical or harmonious arrangement". So we are talking of things which have a relationship to each other and relationship has everything to do with the central reference or "common measure" as it is often called. In early days, relatively speaking, Marcus Vitruvius - a first century B.C. architect and engineer in Rome, wellknown amongst architectural historians for his reference treatise On Architecture wrote "Common harmony, symmetry and unity arise from a common measure being used to construct the parts"; i.e. there must be a single unifying principle that connects the parts.

Man the Measure

In the case of a lot of ancient works of architecture, we find the form of man, as in mankind, a completed man, is used as the measure that the various body parts relate to the dimensions of the parts of the temple or the building under construction. We find this theme recurring over and over again and clearly used in relatively recent times by the Bauhaus Movement, a school founded in 1919 by Walter Gropius - an architect who, in many ways, was the father of modern office-block architecture. He liked to base all the proportions of building structures on which he worked - from office-blocks to kitchen cupboards - using the measure of man and reference to its parts as the measuring stick. It is a precious theme, also in expressing architectural structures and in other visual arts. In looking for order, we are looking for a single unifying principle a that connects the parts.

We live in the natural universe, which has always been seen, since ancient times, as a harmonious, unified structure. The term "Universe" comes from the Latin "Uni" meaning One and "versum" meaning to

turn. In this name, the principle of what the ancients observed is expressed, being an entire structure that turns as one Greeks referred to it as "Cosmos" which, of course, means Order, again expressing what they observed. When we examine nature, find patterns, recurring themes. everywhere; in forms of symmetry, repetitions, spirals, circles, curves;

in processes such as cyclical events, planetary motions; in interlocking functions; in physical laws (discovered through their reputability); in behaviours (whether in the various kingdoms or in our own world) involving mutual cooperation and repeated patterns. So we find that in nature there are lots of orderly structures to

be explored, many still unknown; it is a matter of connecting this with various other principles that can be looked at.

The reason we can study a law or pattern is because it is regular. We study the regularity of a pattern so it can be Understanding brings various understood. powers of potential control. Yet, there is a paradox that a pattern is repetition and on the other hand everything is individually unique e.g. palm leaves are structured with a general pattern of commonality but if we get out the measuring stick and take a close look, we find that each leaf is different in its own right. The Paradox - we can be infinitely delighted by every unique and individual expression of nature and also regularity recognise of pattern and commonality of structure and Patterns express a principle in common; general characteristics we can abstract and describe, and this is the unifying principle of Form.

Unity of Nature

In our inner world we also find patterns e.g. thought - hence our word "idea" from the Greek $\epsilon \imath \delta os$, which means pattern. Turning to Emanuel Swedenborg, we find that he has much to say about the unity of nature. In his very rational words, in the True Christian Religion, paragraph 13, he says the following:

"The reason the oneness of God can be deduced from the creation of the universe is that the universe is a single system coherently organised from beginning to end, and dependent on God as the body is on the soul. The universe was so created that God could be omnipresent, and keep all its particulars under His guidance, and keep it perpetually together as a Unit, and so preserve it. This too is why Jehovah God says that He is the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End, the Alpha and the Omega, and elsewhere that he does everything, spreads out the heavens, and stretches out the earth, of Himself. This mighty system which is called the universe is a single unit coherently organised from beginning to end, because God had one End in view in creating it, to create from the human race a heaven of angels. The means to this end are all the things of which the world is composed; for he who wills the End, wills also the Means.

The man therefore who contemplates the world as a piece of work containing the means to that end can contemplate the created universe as a single coherent unit, and he can see that the world is an assemblage of services structured for the benefit of the human race, to form a heaven of angels. The Divine Love cannot have any other end in view than from His Divine to make human beings eternally blessed; and His Divine Wisdom cannot produce anything but services designed to fulfil that end. considering the world from this Universal point of view, every wise man can grasp that the Creator of the Universe is One, and that His essence is Love and Wisdom. Consequently, there is no detail in it which does not conceal services either nearly or distantly designed to benefit human beings. Their food is provided by the fruits of the earth and also by animals, their clothing from the same sources".

One Stupendous Whole

Something similar is expressed in poetic form by Alexander Pope:-

"All are but part of the one stupendous whole, whose body nature is, and God the soul".

"Here then we rest: "The Universal Cause Acts to one end, but acts by various laws"".

"Look around our World; behold the chain of Love Combining all below and all above".

"See the sole bliss Heaven could on all bestow! Which who but feels can taste, but thinks can know: Yet poor with fortune, and with learning blind, The bad must miss; the good, untaught, will find; Slave to no sect, who takes no private road, But looks through nature up to nature's God; Pursues that chain which links the immense design, Joins heaven and earth, and mortal and divine; Sees, that no being any bliss can know, But touches some above, and some below; Learns, from this union of the rising Whole, The first, last purpose of the human soul; And knows, where Faith, Law, Morals, all began, All end, in Love of God, and Love of Man".

The Expression of Beauty

What are we looking for by the term The

According to the Macquarie Dictionary, Art is the production or expression of what is beautiful (esp. visually appealing), or of more than ordinary significance. Power is provided by something having meaning beyond the ordinary - the Power of Art. The term "Art" comes from the Latin "Artem" meaning Skill and a lot could be made of that on its own! It is impossible to cover all of the arts comprehensively in just one evening but aspects which apply to one can, by analogy, be extended to all "Arts". i.e. to all products of creativity and "skill" such as music, drama, literature and poetry, visual arts, dance, story-telling, myth-making, etc.

To understand the arising of artistic expression through the vehicle humankind, we need to look at the history of our species. According to mainstream archaeology:

About 8 million years ago (y.a.) the Human Lineage separated from the Animals - the start of the line of Australopithecines.

1.8 million y.a., another change when early Homo Habilis species lived in Tanzania.

1.5 million to 500,000 y.a. Homo Erectus (smaller brain, larger teeth) reigned in Africa, Asia and Europe. It was not until 350,000 y.a. that our present species Homo Sapiens ("wise Man") arose, descended from Homo Erectus with a larger brain. Homo Sapiens are the only living species of Hominid Family (i.e. Family of Man). Hominid Family (i.e. Family of Man).

We have virtually no trace of the life styles of those in the human lineage for most of the first 6 million years. There was some form of change about 2.4 million y.a. enabling man to create very simple tools out of stone and from then on there is an increasing number of artefacts for investigation.

Earliest use of fire in caves - 1 million y.a.
 First known ornament (mammoth Tooth

Amulet) - 100,000 B.C. Australia settled 60,000 y.a.

 First musical instruments (bones as percussion and wind instruments) and earliest Cave Paintings - 25,000 B.C.

Oclay Counting Tokens (Mesopotamia) - 8,000 y.a.

 Major Architectural development - in 2,980 -2,950 B.C.

Why was there such a long period of human lineage with no remains? The ancients were content with living from day-to-day from the provisions they knew would be available to meet their needs from their vast experience and intuition of their surroundings (there were few shortcomings so far as food and other necessities were concerned). What drove the creative developments? Man's desire to know the patterns of the natural cycles was not simple curiosity, but rather to leverage them to his advantage; predicability provides control.

Dating back to about 25,000 B.C. we have the following findings:-

- notches on bones which made calendars to count days between cyclical events such as lunar cycles, floods, ripening of crops, etc.
- clay tokens to count traded goods followed later by marks in clay tablets which developed into cuneiform writing.

Whilst astronomical observations went on a long, long time before, the appearance of

these particular artefacts indicates entering into the time-movement recording phase, starting a significant trend - recording the present, which becomes the record of the past, and an aid for predicting the future, thus bringing an element of control. This interest in Order is considered by historians as a huge leap forward in man's intellect. Emanuel Swedenborg has another view the neglecting of the Divine as the source for everything needed - "the fall", a looking for advantages from knowing the natural world on their own account. The focus of living totally in the present shifted from spiritual harmony and direct influx from the Divine to an excitement over discovery of patterns of nature bringing with it the possibility of new applications for the "benefit" of man. This could be seen as a spiritual decline, a trading of the Most Ancient mode of existence for the Ancient mode of life.

Loss of the Spiritual State

Ancient art expressed things that eventually became lost through a concentration on outer living; the art remained as an expression of the people's development at that time, recording processes and states of spiritual well-being. Certain people recognised the decline that was taking place, or perhaps they were simply inspired by the Divine to do what they did, but much of the early art forms that we now have, e.g. at Lascaux, are very hard to explain unless it can be sensed that they are an expression of a personal or general spiritual state recorded for posterity - a reminder for those who do not have this knowledge but work on these processes of how to live spiritually and in spiritual harmony. Interestingly, these expressions in art forms, attempting to reinspire mankind to become reconnected with the spiritual aspect of living, are repeated with similar characteristics throughout the various isolated parts of the inhabited world e.g. pyramid building, all forms of religious art, etc.

The term "Religion" in itself says a lot because the Latin Re-Ligere ("Re" = Back and "Ligere" to Bind) means to bind back to the source from whence we came. religious function in art is recording spiritual development for reference because it was no longer man's only occupation and concern. Structures were built which codify the knowledge of spiritual development, then relegated to representative people such as kings and priests who had certain functions to perform in keeping this knowledge alive and who were expected to live it, i.e. the King was the representative of a perfected or transformed man, the priest the instructor of (originally spiritual issues these functions rested in the same person).

Throughout history we also find the arising of sacred law, which is passed on by word of mouth and in family/tribe traditions, being the sacred knowledge which the people retained for as long as possible, on how one is to work upon oneself in order to become transformed to reinstate the original paradise within. Later, this developed into sacred literature, into myths of restoration of order from chaos such as the story of the flood (signifying an emotional corruption and how to recover from such situations), tales containing correspondences, architectural structures for religious uses/worship such as temples, churches and cathedrals which served both as an inspirational device and as a reminder recording both natural and spiritual knowledge of the time when built the Pyramids/Stonehenge.

Spiritual Transformation

The highest function in art, in all its varied forms, is to awaken modern man to aspire to re-orient himself or herself to the inner world through the process of spiritual transformation. We can make great use of art from a careful analysis of the principles underlying the artistic expression to make our own lives a work of art, and fulfil our primary function within creation to restore spiritual order.

"Since man is the principal end in view in creation, it follows that everything was created on his account; so every detail of order was made applicable to him and concentrated on him, in order that by means of him God could perform primary services. Love and wisdom without their third partner, service, can be equated with the sun's heat and light, which would be empty principles unless they worked on men, animals and plants; but they become real by irradiating them and working on them. End, cause and effect are a trio with a fixed sequence.

PRAYERS






One of the suggestions made during the **Brainstorming** session at the 1994 AGM was to ask Members to remember the Swedenborg Association of Australia in their prayers.



JACOB'S LADDER -

an Art Installation at The Swedenborg Centre

Michael Wright's installation of "Jacob's Ladder" approaches a subject, to which many intellectual approaches have been taken, from the feeling side of objective art. Whether one relates better to the 3dimensional effect of objects or the 2dimensional form of artwork which is able to present things beyond the laws of space and gravity, both are presented here simultaneously, creating a most unusual effect - more appropriately termed as a "shock". The leap faced by the observer "shock". The leap faced by the observer here comes in translating the feelings generated by the art into an understanding of the depicted process, without losing the feelings. Objective art finds its greatest use with a truly conscious observer. This is the challenge presented to us when observing objectively created works - how much can we "snap" ourselves out of our waking "sleep state" and view and interact and understand and feel for what is presented before us with the greatest possible intensity. Jacob's Ladder presents us with a theme dealing with the movement and flow of energies through many levels simultaneously - in viewing it in an objectively presented format - how well can we relate to its theme and how well can we apply the ideas presented to our own struggles?



SWEDENBORG AND MODERN PSYCHOLOGY

A talk given in Perth, December 1994

About a dozen or so people turned up to Allan and Ester Uren's home for a special meeting of the Perth SAA Group just before the onslaught of Santa Claus. After a lovely dinner organised by the group, visiting SAA Director, Vandermeer, Joe gave interesting talk linking Swedenborg's ideas presented in Rational Psychology (using the book as a guide) to the development of modern psychology. The talk covered a broad spectrum of Swedenborg's ideas, and compared the orderly unfolding of the work Rational Psychology to the orderly maturing and spiritualisation of his insights and writings. Swedenborg's experience of his own transformation and his description of of reformation processes regeneration were discussed with reference to his Journal of Dreams and The True Christian Religion. Joe also mentioned the work of several leading psychologists influenced by Swedenborg, including Carl Jung, Maurice Nicoll, and Wilson van Dusen. In all, it was a pleasant and stimulating evening of shared insights and warm hospitality.



- A God and Religion for All People in Every Age.

Thirty-eight members and friends attended the first of the series of monthly talks planned in Sydney for this year by the Swedenborg Association. Patrick Johnson, the Editor of "Lifeline" magazine (UK) and a former President of The Swedenborg Society with headquarters in London, drew upon his obvious love of history, the classics and architecture to graphically illustrate some of the parallels between the myths and histories of various cultures and religions to show us the overall pattern of recorded This started of course with the universally harmomous period of the Golden Age depicted in the Bible as the Garden of Eden. Swedenborg referred to this as the period of "the Most Ancient Church". The end of this age of innocence is recorded in many ancient allegorical sources and has

been followed by subsequent ages with their own distinct characteristics until the dawn of the present industrial and technological age, which began in the second half of the 18th Century. Swedenborg was present at the beginning of this age, which he associated with "the New Church".

And what a remarkable transformation there has been so far in this new age! Initially marked in the physical world by political revolution, exploration and the sometimes dubious benefits of colonialism, the tempo of the age is at present marked by an astounding increase in population and urbanisation, and changes in commerce and technology unprecedented in history.

While the pace of change gives rise to some apprehension, it is also a wonderful opportunity to improve both the physical and the spiritual wellbeing of millions of people. It is useful and comforting to look at the present apparently turbulent times and see that they are not the outcome of a random process of the survival of the fittest but are in fact wonderfully structured by the operation of loving and directed forces.


In the final part of his talk, Patrick briefly referred to the process of our own development as individuals, which mirrors that of our collective history. We ourselves start as innocent infants and ideally proceed through various stages of awareness towards our own internal New Age. Once again the process, as painful as it often is, can be seen in retrospect to be guided by loving forces.

AROUND THE GLOBE

For a quite small world-wide movement, there is a remarkable amount of Swedenborg publishing and promoting activities We really have room here for happening. just a taste but if any reader would like to receive more details on particular items please contact The Swedenborg Centre in North Ryde. Most of the information given below has been extracted from the regular issued bv the Swedenborg International, Publishers an umbrella organisation begun in 1990 for bodies within the global Swedenborg Movement engaged in publishing.

EASTERN EUROPE

The demolition of the Iron Curtain has seen an "explosion" of activity throughout all the old Communist Block countries, nearly all of it initiated by readers of Swedenborg (individuals and small groups) living in these Some have connections going countries. back pre-communist times underground copies of Swedenborg's works and even meeting together. At this time it is hard to get any sort of overall picture of what is happening. Much financial, equipment and manpower help is being given from Swedenborg organisations in Sweden, Netherlands, U.S.A. and U.K. to assist projects.

In Moscow in 1991, 10,000 copies of The New Jerusalem were printed In the same year several distributed. Swedenborg scholars from the west were involved in a Russian Philosophical Conference in Leningrad. 100,000 copies of Heaven & Hell in Russian were printed in <u>Kiev</u> in 1993 and quickly sold out. 10,000 copies together introductory material have now been printed in Moscow, where an Association for the Study of Swedenborg's Spiritual Legacy has been formed. This Association in conjunction with the Institute of Man of the Russian Academy of Sciences sponsored a Conference "Swedenborg and Russia" in November 1994. About 30 scholars from Moscow, St. Petersburg, Kiev, Riga and

other places participated together with speakers several Swedenborgian from America and Western Europe, including Dr. Michael Stanley who toured Eastern Australia for two months in 1993. were 13 presentations. One of the American visitors reported: "It is very evident that the Russians are unusually open to belief in the reality of the spiritual world". All very exciting!

In <u>Ukraine</u> a new Swedenborg Group was established at L'vov in 1992. "The Dawn" publishing company in <u>Warsaw (Poland)</u> have printed 5,000 copies of **Heaven & Hell**, incorporating in the preface material from Trobridge's biography of Swedenborg, in Polish. And 3,000 pamphlets containing selections from Swedenborg's works were printed in <u>Budapest (Hungary)</u> in 1992. This distribution resulted in many orders for tape recordings of **Menny Es Pokol** (Heaven & Hell). 5,000 copies of the Serbo-Croatian **Nebo I Pakao** (Heaven & Hell) were sold out shortly after being printed in Yugoslavia (1992). **My Religion** is also available in Serbo-Croatian.

The interest that has come into the daylight in Czechoslovakia goes back many decades to the time when a New Church Society flourished there. The International Psychologists Association held a "Science & Spirituality" Conference in Prague in the summer of 1992 and a booth exhibiting Swedenborgian thought was well appreciated. Understandably, there is a tremendous thirst for religious literature; fortunately printing costs are still relatively Swedenborg's Doctrine of Life has been published in Czech, and now more is expected using a desk top publishing system provided by Britain together with an old fashioned photocopier. Visitors Czechoslovakia have reported the enthusiasm of those involved in the Swedenborg movement there. Two relatively young family men have recently completed training courses at the Swedenborg Theological Colleges in Britain and USA and are now working in their native land to spread the awareness of the truths to be found in Swedenborg's writings.

NORTHERN EUROPE

In Sweden, the Swedenborg Association there has published Swedenborg in South Stockholm (an historical account with new documents), The Word from Experience, Four Doctrines and The White Horse. Mr Berquist, a former Swedish Ambassador, has received a Government grant to write a new Swedish biography of Swedenborg. A lot of activity is happening in the Netherlands through Swedenborg Genootschap (Swedenborg Society), which publishes a comprehensive journal Swedenborgiana quarterly. The first Dutch Symposium was very successfully held in Amsterdam in March 1994 with lectures, screening of the Swedenborg film, an art and demonstration Swedenborg computer program.

During October, there was a Swedenborg stand at the world's foremost Book Fair in Frankfurt, Germany. And in the Artic regions, three books Heaven & Hell, My Religion and Presence of Other Worlds have all been published and distributed throughout Iceland by a very enthusiastic reader working on his own.

THE ORIENT

The Arcana Press in <u>Tokyo</u> has been a very prolific publisher over the past eight years with modern Japanese editions of **Divine Providence**, **Heaven & Hell**, **True Christian Religion**, **Conjugial Love**, **The New Jerusalem** plus several smaller items. Sales have been very brisk and some copies have been distributed to public libraries. Another group, the Japan Kyobun Sha also in <u>Tokyo</u>, published Odhner's **The Human Mind** in Japanese in the early 1990's. Yet another publishing group in <u>Tokyo</u> - **Tama Publishing Company** - has printed one of

Brian Kingslake's books, Bruce Henderson's Window to Eternity, and Journal of Dreams in Japanese.

In <u>Beijing</u>, a young lady who was introduced to Swedenborg by Mr. Lars Berquist when he was Ambassador there, is working towards producing in Chinese some material on **Marriage Love**.

SOUTH AMERICA

Another continent where publishing activities are happening. Earlier this century, Spanish editions of Swedenborg's writings were available to those in the Spanish-speaking countries of the world. Now there are few but this is beginning to be put right. A Spanish translation of **Heaven & Hell** has now been published in <u>Buenos Aires</u> adding to **The Essential Swedenborg** published there several years ago. A <u>Portuguese</u> translation of **Heaven & Hell** has also been printed in <u>Brazil</u> and the publisher is now looking towards the production of **Arcana Caelestia** and **Earths in the Universe**.


