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#### Celebration of Spring 1995 Opening Address by Dr. Molly Peglar

I am delighted to be here tonight to participate with you in this Celebration of Spring. I was honoured to be asked to say a few words, particularly as it is a Celebration of Spring and the associated symbolism and correspondences.

The programme promises us a joyful evening in which I am sure we will find new knowledge and inspiration. It will be full of interest for each of us and I would like to share with you tonight two particular interests that I have.

The first is my love of the garden. Spring is a very special time. It's a time of regeneration and new growth; a time to be at peace with nature. In the last few weeks when we've been enjoying the fantastic spring weather my family went walking in the Budi National Park, just up the coast. As we wandered along the path, through the gum trees with ferns and flannel flowers in the bush I was reminded of a Robert Frost poem "The Road not Taken" in which a traveller in a wood came to where two roads divided. The traveller had a choice - which one to follow? - and the choice was made to take - ( and I quote) "The one less travelled by and that made all the difference."

We are also told of a choice of paths in the Old Testament, when in Proverbs we find the instruction. "In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He shall direct thy paths."

We know from Swedenborg's Teaching that paths correspond to truths, " and truths and goods cannot be acknowledged unless with those whose interior mind is opened".

So a journey along a path in Spring opens up new meanings for us, and my journey brings me to my second interest tonight which is my work in the field of Bacteriology.



We use microscopes every day at work and I am reminded that one of the first microscopes was made by a Dutchman, Anton van Leeuwenhoek in the late 17th Century. Swedenborg visited Leeuwenhoek and then he also made a microscope with which he was able to study these "animcules" (as they were called) and observe this new microscopic world.

When using the microscope we don't always appreciate the correspondences we should ponder on, but an observation I would like

to share with you concerns my study of the staphylocoecal bacteria.

Bacteria can, by transformation, take in new DNA to add to their genetic composition. As DNA corresponds to a truth we can relate to this situation when we also take in new truths. The bacteria can store their new DNA as a separate particle in their cytoplasm - but in this form it can easily be lost during cell replication and growth - however the bacteria, can by means of a special genetic element - a transponson - insert this new DNA into their chromosome where it is less easily lost. We too want to be careful not to lose the new truths we acquire.

The bacteria now have a choice to either express this new knowledge or not - they can use this new knowledge to survive in an adverse environment, just as we can.


However once the bacteria have acquired the new information they still need special conditions to grow. Many require an influx of heat, which corresponds to love and charity, and a supply of oxygen or truth and knowledge.

As scientists today we can, with new molecular technology, visualise this DNA - the truth - we can identify different strains of the same species by the pattern of DNA they contain. To do this, we crack open the cell and extract the DNA and cut it into pieces with enzymes. This extract is then placed in a agar gel (in wells or holes) through which an alternating electric current is passed. In this field of energy the DNA pieces separate out into recognisable patterns, which can be seen under UV light - so the different strains of bacteria are identified. I often ponder then on how clearly our inner states must also be identifiable.

During the course of my work I've also been excited to recognise wonderful mandalas in the structure of many viruses, particularly the herpes and retroviruses - they are fascinating. The energy field used in the DNA separation work operates in a hexagonal pattern and I have used this mandala pattern to gain new insights which have enriched my life.

So as we join in this Spring Celebration tonight may we enjoy the experience, and may we gain new truths and insights that will enable us to grow as we make our journey along the path. Thank you. It is with pleasure I declare this celebration open.

## 1995 Celebration of Spring

As we sat down in readiness for the opening of the 1995 Celebration of Spring I can recall wondering "is it really twelve months since the last Celebration of Spring?". Actually, it was 53 weeks! About 90 (all seated on chairs this year) were warmly welcomed to the occasion by SAA President Kevin Attwater, after which he handed over the evening to the charming and vivacious Deborah Kennedy. Displayed around the rooms of the Swedenborg Centre, North Ryde, were 30 works of art each disclosing much creative talent in expressing aspects of Christian and Sufi Sacred Symbolic Processes, this year's theme. These set the tone for the rest of the evening during which we were treated to a veritable feast of creative talent in the forms of monologue, music, movement and mirth.

In officially declaring the celebration open, Molly Peglar (Senior Lecturer. Infectious Diseases, Sydney University Medical School) brought her love of gardens and specialised knowledge in bacteriology to make some connections between natural and spiritual truths. Her talk is printed elsewhere in this newsletter and it is well worth reading in its entirety. Other informative short talks to explain something of the underlying symbolism within their worship patterns and rituals were presented by Archbishop Aghan Baliozian (Armenian),

Revd. Julian Duckworth (Christian - Swedenborgian) and Ross Nassif (Coptic). All three were well appreciated; perhaps a special word of thanks to Archbishop Baliozian who so generously gave of his time despite departing for an extended overseas trip the next day. His concluding story was very poignant, highlighting the need to love one another.

Music was provided in the form of classical Persian by a group of three stalented instrumentalists playing traditional Persian instruments; and towards the end of the evening by Pentala, a choir of five singers, whose dulcet tones held the audience spellbound with a 12th Century chant, an Australian setting of Psalm 121, and their composition Harmonic Spirit. Traditional Middle Eastern belly dances performed by Kerry Taylor brought a real flow of movement to the evening, and a contrast to the elegant and soothing movement of classical Persian dances by Julie Miller.

Monologue, music and movement came together in a segment devoted to the 13th century Persian poet Maulana Jahal-up-din Rumi. An introduction by Lynne Heir was followed with a reading of Rumi's poem Song of the Reed by Marion Van den Driesschen, accompanied by sounds of a flute and the grace of a Persian dance. Mirth was provided during short breaks by two itinerant Middle Eastern gents, Mulla and Farook (alias Lachlan Hinds and Joe Vandermeer), who brought their own brand of distilled knowledge of Mohammedan theology and law to everyday situations - well, perhaps not everyday.

The 1995 Swedenborg Prize for Religious Art was awarded to Kay Keller for her depthful painting Spring in Australia 1995, incorporating meaningful symbolism. This work is now on permanent display at the Swedenborg Centre. The inaugural Swedenborg Prize for Original Research Literary went to Lachlan Hind for his dissertation Essay on Swedenborg and Homoeopathy. Congratulations were extended to these two winners but also to all who submitted work this year, the judges recognising the high standard of all pieces.

All in all the evening was a mystical experience for participants and audience alike. Thanks to all who helped in large and small ways towards the event's success, especially those who provided the supper and **Michael Wright** who for the fourth year did a marvellous job of co-ordinating all aspects of the celebration. #### A CHRISTMAS MEDITATION

Tradition has it that on one occasion the Duke of Wellington was accosted by a stranger with the words, "Mr. Robinson, I believe!" The Duke's response



was brief and to the point. "Sir, if you believe that, you will believe anything!" Clearly, the "Iron Duke" did not agree with Paul's injunction to "suffer fools gladly".

I introduce this Christmas meditation with this anecdote because the Duke's reply seems to be indicative of the attitude of so many people towards the essential message of the true Christian religion: in particular as it is restated in the teachings of Emanuel Swedenborg. The very essence of Christmas celebrations is that in the birth of "the Babe of Bethlehem" there was nothing less than the Incarnation of Almighty God: the fulfilment in time of all the prophecies given from the earliest days of mankind. And there are many people who say, in effect, "if you believe this, you'll believe anything".

Our familiarity with so many Christmas carols which are broadcast in shops and market-places from early November onwards conditions our minds into imagining that there was something very unusual about that night in which Jesus was born: a spirit of electrifying expectation! Yet this is surely a misconception: in overwhelming degree men went about their affairs as usual unconcerned about anything else but the census decreed by Caesar Augustus and the disruption this caused to their everyday lives.

And had we been among them what would have been our reaction to the story of that band of simple shepherds. They claimed, you will recall, that while they were tending their flocks that night they had both seen and heard a group of angels: these heavenly messengers had told them of the birth of a baby boy who was the long awaited Messiah: more than this, these angels had directed them to his very birth-place, a manger behind an Inn. It is recorded that "everyone who heard their story was astonished at what the shepherds had to What is involved in that word say." "astonished"? I think it is undeniable that many of those accosted by these shepherds would have said in effect, "if people believe this, they will believe anything".

Emanuel Swedenborg, writing of the decadence of the first Christian Church and of the promise or prophecy of the Lord's

Second Advent, makes a claim that is at the very least astonishing and in some ways parallel to that of these shepherds. He writes:

"Since the Lord cannot manifest Himself in person and yet He predicted that he would come and found a new church, which is the New Jerusalem, it follows that He will do this by means of a man, who cannot only receive intellectually the doctrines of this church, but also publish them in print. I bear witness that the Lord has shown Himself in the presence of me, His servant, and sent me to perform this function. After this He opened the sight of my spirit, thus admitting me to the spiritual world, and allowing me to see the heavens and the hells, and also to talk with angels and spirits; and this I have now been doing for many years without a break...In order that the Lord could be constantly present with me, He has revealed to me the spiritual sense of His Word, in which Divine truth is illuminated by its own light, and in this He is continually present.. True Christian Religion 780,781

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There have been - and there are - those who on hearing of this claim have "gone to Bethlehem": have been led to a new examination of the Sacred Scriptures to see what they really teach concerning the Lord and the nature and purpose of Divine Love. And, like those shepherds of the Christmas story, have praised and glorified God for all that they have seen and heard in these Writings. And, yet again, there are others who are quite astonished that anyone can be so simple-minded to accept this testimony of Swedenborg. They say, in effect, "if people can believe this, they will believe anything".

An unusual Christmas meditation, perhaps! Yet in many respects the essence of Christmas has become merely a question of showing goodwill to all people: of putting aside personal animosities and resentments for a brief period. And, in one sense, there is again no room in the Inn for consideration of a deeper understanding of revealed truth. I suggest that a true celebration of Christmas is not merely a matter of natural and emotional goodwill, but something that of necessity must involve the effort to enter more fully and more deeply into an intelligent and intellectual understanding of the things of faith. Today, no less than in the days when Jesus was born in Bethlehem, such understanding of Divine Truth is often passed by as of little account. It is considered as an adjunct to life, as the stable was an adjunct to the Inn. Yet it is in the quiet effort to understand Divine Truth more fully, and this because it is seen as the very expression of Divine Love, that the faith that saves is born and life becomes increasingly more meaningful.

## Discrete Degrees and Our Spiritual Growth

#### - A Swedenborgian Perspective

Kevin Attwater's talk in September at North Ryde was aimed at giving a rational understanding of our spiritual communication with the Divine and the processes of spiritual growth and re-birth.

The topic is a very important one. "The knowledge of degrees is like a key for opening the causes of things. Without this knowledge, scarcely anything of cause can be known,....Interior things can in no way be discovered unless degrees are known"

(Divine Love and Wisdom 184).

The presentation was accompanied by over 20 coloured slides of different levels within a person, presenting in a visual form the Doctrine of Discrete Degrees.

There were many key ideas presented in the well-structured lecture. One of them was that to ascend from one level of life to the discrete plane above requires a new burst of life - equivalent to a new creation signified by the Scriptural 'new birth'.


One of the wonderful aspects of the lecture was seeing how Kevin organised the topic. It was clear that he enjoyed researching the topic and presenting it in a very orderly way. Aspects covered in laying the foundation for the topic were the Chakra system, stages of a person's growth from infancy to adulthood, the doctrine of Influx (which is inseparable from the Doctrine of Discrete Degrees), and the spiritual significance of colours (to help the audience have a better appreciation of the slides).

The main part of the topic followed. It covered the different levels within the spirit and soul of a person, the Will and Understanding, the development of the soul and mind over time starting with man at birth and continuing through to infancy, childhood, youth and adulthood.

Three noteworthy points from the lecture were the following. The celestial degree is opened by those who immediately apply Divine truths to life, and who have no need to reason about the things of faith. The characteristic love of the spiritual man is the love of truth. And simple faith and obedience are the dominant characteristics of those in the natural degree.

## Swedenborg and Judaism



Last October 27th, I greatly enjoyed this talk given by Jack Benson. Far from the world of dollar and cents in which we know him to be the capable Treasurer of the S.A.A., Jack in his address demonstrated his great skill as a thorough and methodical researcher and as an enthusiastic and captivating speaker.

The talk was divided into two parts, the first being a history of the Jewish people, and the development of Judaism. The second part looking at Swedenborg, the influences he was under, and how this relates to his statements and perspectives on the Jews.

Assisted by maps and overview handouts, we were first led through approximately four millennia of Judaic history as seen from their point of view rather than from a Christian perspective. Jack began with the westward displacement of the Hapiru ("Hebrew") tribe out of Mesopotamia (Iraq) circa 2000BCE, which occurred due to pressure from the historical expanding Amorites. The Abraham, chieftain of the Hapiru, led his toward the Mediterranean into Canaan. We then followed the chronological predicament of these people with the history of Jacob, Moses, Kings David and Solomon, and some significant prophets. influences examined included the attack on Canaan from Assyria, exile under the Babylonians, subsequent freedom, and later conquests by the Greeks and Romans.

Jack paid the same careful attention to reviewing almost two millennia of history in our Common Era, with reference to the main Jewish events and characters. commenced with the strands of belief that existed around the turn of the era and the way in which Yeshua (later called "Jesus") diverted from these. Jack then mentioned the destruction of the temple and of Jerusalem city by the Romans. This led to the dispersion of Jews, and their subsequent plight in Eastern Europe, England, Holland, Spain, etc, where they contended with the spread of Christianity and Islam, the effect of the French Revolution and of the Reformation, and even the recent holocaust. Meanwhile, revolutions in thinking were moulded by exceptional Jewish scholars, such as Maimonides and Spinoza. structure and history of Jewish religious

literature were also introduced during which I was particularly interested to hear that the Kaballah ("Hidden Wisdom," the mystical Judaic literature) has as its central theme one that equates with Swedenborg's Grand Man.

The second part of the talk dealt with Swedenborg's time in Sweden, England, and Holland, and looked at the Jewish situation and at sentiments about the Jews in those These were related Swedenborg's comments on the Jewish people and their history, statements which appear no more or less critical than his observations of any other cultural group. Whilst some authors see Swedenborg's remarks as being anti-Semitic, Jack indicated that these could hardly be regarded as such. Emanuel was himself well versed in Hebrew, and even though he was most probably surrounded all his life by extensive anti-Jewish prejudice from Lutheran and Catholic Europe, he nevertheless showed a strong desire to seek out Jewish communities in the spiritual world (as reported in The Spiritual Diary).

Naturally, Jack would have liked more time to reveal lots of other interesting insights gleaned from his research. Maybe there will one day be a second instalment (or book perhaps?), although I am content that what was said invigorated my own enquiries. The evening was recorded on audio-tape for those who are interested. In all, I found it a fascinating talk that was enthusiastically presented. Many thanks to Jack for his fine efforts!

# Correspondence

"Although not a "Swedenborgian" in the proper sense of the term, I have nevertheless read much of his works and - with allowance made for the style in which he necessarily recorded his knowledge as the written word - accept and believe in the basic truths in what he tells us.

Of course, he wrote from the absolute conviction that only comes from personal experience ...something very different from "faith" that generally relies only on belief. It is understandable that neither is likely to "cut much ice" when conveyed to someone not yet ready to seek the real truth! However, I suggest that is something about which those with firm beliefs should not unduly worry.

I say that because we are all rather likened to individual islands separated from one another by a mist of materialism that only permits each to see the physical characteristics of the others and to form opinions as to what may exist within. It is quite certain that all will ultimately reach the point where a more spiritual approach begins to take shape ...... and if that sounds a somewhat mundane way of seeing things it is because everything around us is transitory, and in a way only a kind of illusion.

As someone nearing the end of life here, but with that lifetime spent searching, I guess I have been fortunate to enjoy from a very early age, conviction brought by experience, and consequently been able to concentrate upon other aspects of "Life" rather than whether or not what we have here is all there is!

If I may impose upon your patience a little more:- We make our entrance into this world by courtesy of our parents (and theirs before them ad infinitum) to become clothed in a kind of camouflage outfit put together by them, but made of a uniform material and cut to a standard pattern for all mankind that not only covers up but leaves little of our true nature apparent!

Because of the very nature of that material vessel which covers each of us, it also forms a kind of barrier between what we are and what we actually see and identify as ourselves. This barrier is not absolutely impenetrable but does require a great deal of application to get through.

Again because of it's nature, this barrier impedes and distorts our perception of all things that are generated by the mind before they can become transmitted to the brain

which is the activating medium in the materialistic sense.

The mind is the expressive voice of who and what we each really are, the brain only the physical organ by which physical thoughts are generated and transformed into action. That there have been - and are - those among us that manage to reach through the mind in a more direct manner and thereby get close to the truth that has always been known to us, is evidence it can be done.....and offers hope to us all that we can also do it if we persevere.

Of course, those who succeed must perforce interpret, and express, what they then learn from the mind in such terms, and in accordance with such experience, as they understand... hence the variations and even sometimes apparent contradictions that can cause their rejection.

That Swedenborg was among those who have opened the door to the mind and the knowledge that is to be found on the other side is undoubted .... but he is not alone!

In conclusion: One of the most wonderful powers bestowed upon man through his mind is that of creation.....and it has managed to filter through into our lives here on earth through our ability to think. All creation begins with the thought! Everything mankind has ever done or achieved started as a thought, and we can look around this planet and beyond today and see our creations all around us! But we should realise all this is material creation and not to be confused with anything else .....what we create here is only transitory and not infinite."

#### Healing the Psyche

Those who came along on 24th November to hear Brian O'Neill talk on The Spiritual Dimension in Healing the experienced more of a workshop than a lecture. In fact the evening was a practical demonstration of the central point that Brian brought before us - the healing of the psyche process does not lie in knowledge but lies within the person, that is getting into touch with the inner love and wisdom processes. For too long those working in the mental health field have generally treated patients as objects - the "I and it" approach - rather than as "me and you" which is a process of connecting and relating to patients, enabling them to feel love. Brian's own discipline "Gestalt (literally meaning whole) psychology" is centred around the latter approach which, unlike mainstream psychology and psychiatry, has a spiritual component to it.

Brian explained how his introduction to the teachings of Swedenborg, via the books of van Dusen (also Psychologist), had set him off in a new direction in his work by recognising the influence of the spiritual world with those experiencing a state of altered reality bringing voices and delusions. Treatment must take this into account. He then invited us to experience something of our inner world and processes by leading a Guided Imagery. The sharing of experiences turned out to be quite fascinating and Brian used these, plus an extended question/discussion period to further show how getting in touch with inner thoughts and feelings can be of value to everyone as well as a necessary process for those working in the mental health field. Brian's relaxed style, infectious wit and the inclusion of movie scenes (he is a self-proclaimed movie buff) when added to his obvious love of his work, made the evening enjoyable and very helpful.

Em- Swedenborg

In every other earth, Divine Truth is manifested by word of mouth through spirits and angels, as was stated in the foregoing pages, in treating of the inhabitants of the earths in this solar system. But this takes place within families; for in most earths the human race dwell distinct according to families; wherefore, Divine Truth thus revealed through spirits and angels is not conveyed far beyond the families, and unless a new revelation constantly succeeds, it is either perverted, or perishes. It is otherwise on our Earth, where the Divine Truth, which is the Word, remains in its integrity for ever.
