Most of our opinions are derived from newspapers, TV news and comments from friends and those we respect. How much of our opinion, is our opinion? If we have an opinion about a recent film it is of little consequence whether we truly hold an opinion or not but in the world's affairs today, when we are on the brink of war, our opinion is very important.

Presidents and Prime Ministers express opinions for us because they have the ear of foreign countries and they are presumably aware of more facts than ourselves. Their opinion will decide whether to war or not. How are we to form an opinion on these matters of war or no war and how will our opinion count?

Among the more sublime disclosures through Swedenborg, few are more important in a practical point of view, than his doctrine concerning Divine Providence. The author shows with a clarity unequalled by other writers, that there is no such thing as blind chance; that the universe in general and in the particular is governed by infinite Love which is guided in all its operations by an infinite Wisdom. It teaches that infinite Love never forsakes one human soul, not even in that soul's darkest hour. This Love pursues every individual through all their devious wanderings - sometimes with warning and entreaty, sometimes with rebuke and chastisement - always yearning to save or bless. We do not know what will happen in the future. We can be sure that whatever happens, it will be for our greater good.

I believe, though, we need to have an opinion about these events. I would feel comforted to think none of this world conflict was my fault but experience and reason suggests fault lies on both sides. We have to stand back from the uncontrolled thoughts that drop uninvited into the mind. We have to say No to many of the thoughts which are not ours and accept only those to which we have given deep consideration. ## Science and Religion

## An edited version of an address given by Geoff Forster to the Swedenborg Association of Australia Ltd Melbourne Group meeting on 27th July 2002

A Swedenborg Association meeting is an eminently suitable venue to explore such a topic, in view of Swedenborg's major contributions to science, and then his subsequent enrichment of religion as a result of his visionary experiences. Several areas will be explored.

#### The Anthropic Principle

This can be expressed as follows:

Human life and consciousness on planet earth is closely connected with the fact that various parameters in physics have values in extremely narrow ranges. Numerous examples can be given.

**Hugh Ross**<sup>1</sup>, Canadian astrophysicist, lists 32 parameters in the galaxy-sun-earth-moon system which must be "just right" for carbon-based life to exist on earth. Examples include axial tilt, rotation period, age of earth, magnetic field strength, oxygen to nitrogen ratio in the atmosphere, and carbon dioxide level in the atmosphere.

However, some of the quantitative data are staggering.

According to **Paul Davies**<sup>2</sup> the ratio between the gravitational force and the weak nuclear force is incredibly fine tuned, to an accuracy of  $10^{60}$  (i.e. a million repeated 10 times). An increase of that infinitesimal magnitude either way would have respectively led to:

- (a) an explosive expansion so that no galaxies would have been formed, or
- (b) a corresponding decrease would have led to a catastrophic collapse.

If in a lottery of a million participants, the same person won it 10 times in a row, one would strongly suspect a rigging!

Elsewhere Davies<sup>3</sup> writes: "There is for me powerful evidence that something is going on behind it all... It seems as though someone has fine-tuned Nature's numbers to make the universe... The impression of design is overwhelming."

Of course, despite all these remarkable physical constant data, one could say that with all these conditions human life and consciousness just happened to emerge, and that "life is just a fluke among the stars" (H. G. Wells). But surely that strains credulity!

#### Neo-Darwinian Evolution

Eminent authority on world religions, **Huston Smith**<sup>4</sup> has endorsed the view that belief in this idea is the greatest factor underlying religious belief.

What is at issue here is not "microevolution", which is generally accepted, but "macroevolution", i.e large-scale changes and developments, as illustrated in the following quotation from **Marjorie Greene**<sup>5</sup>, an Irish philosopher:

"The colour of moths or snails or the bloom on the castor bean can no doubt be explained by mutation and natural selection, but the origin and persistence of great new modes of life, such as photosynthesis, breathing and thinking, and all the intricate and coordinated changes to explain them, are not conceivable on the Darwinian view. How from single-celled and for that matter from inanimate ancestors there came to be castor beans and moths and snails. and from these emerged llamas and hedgehogs and lions and apes and men that is a question Darwinian theory leaves unasked. With infinite ingenuity it elaborates microscopic conditions for such macroscopic occurrences, but it provides no conceptual framework in terms of which they can be admitted to exist, let alone an 'explanation' of their descent from lower forms."

Sydney scientist, **Michael Denton**<sup>6</sup>, with no religious axe to grind, is severely critical. He maintains that the fundamental axioms of Darwin's macroevolutionary theory - the concept of the continuity of nature, and the belief that all the adapted design of life has resulted from a blind random process - have not been validated by one single empirical discovery or scientific advance since 1859 when Darwin's theory first emerged. His chapter on "**The Puzzle of Perfection**", outlining the staggering complexity of living organisms as revealed by modern powerful microscopes, is devastating as regards this belief system.

**Pierre Grose**, who held the chair for evolution for 30 years at the Sorbonne, wrote:

"The probability of dust carried by the wind reproducing Durer's 'Melancholia' is less infinitesimal than the probability of copy errors in the DNA molecules leading to the formation of the eye; besides these errors have no relationship with the function that the eye would have to perform or was starting to perform."

In other words, mutations - usually negative in effect - have virtually no role leading to the formation of the eye, nor in any case would they be cumulative enough for any feature such as the eye to emerge.

**W. Macneile Dixon**<sup>7</sup> believed that the eye should be a greater source of wonder to us, than the stars.

Overall, at the very least, there seems some justification for Bergson's idea of creative evolution.

#### The Mind

Briefly, the issue here is whether the mind is simply the functioning of the brain, or whether it exists in its own right (dualism). Although the former is very fashionable in medicine, psychology and philosophy, a strong case can be made for dualism. (Of course materialistic monism is antagonistic to religion.) Nobel Prize winning neuroscientist **Sir John Eccles**<sup>8</sup> lists a considerable array of phenomena that are far better explained by dualism rather than materialistic monism.

Incidentally, **David Lorimer**, who is President of The Swedenborg Society in Britain, has just edited a book "*Thinking beyond the Brain*", containing a series of essays by various specialists, and endorsing dualism.

# The I nteraction of Science and Religion

The great successes of the scientific method, together with the technological applications, have been all very obvious. However, these successes have been obtained by concentrating on certain aspects of human experience, notably those subject to quantitative measurements, and usually neglecting others.

There have been various moves to apply the scientific approach to areas usually covered by religion. For example:

- ♦ Physiological measurements demonstrating the value of meditation.
- ♦ The Religious Experience Research Unit, Oxford, set up under the naturalist Alister Hardy, where the methods used in natural history, zoology etc. are applied to the study of religious experiences, though Hardy stressed that this approach is only marginal to the real core of religious experience.

- ♦ The San Francisco "Cardiac" experiment, where a group of hospital patients was randomly divided into two subgroups: one was prayed for by various prayer groups, the other was "the control". Overall, on average, the former subgroup members made a significant recovery. One can of course question the ethics of this venture; however, it was undertaken, so perhaps we should make the most of it!
- ♦ Then there is **Lawrence LeShan's** list of quotations<sup>9</sup>, where the reader is to decide whether they originate from a physicist or a mystic. Very difficult!

The core of religion itself is however, I suggest, as follows: the insights of, or disclosure to, a suitably developed and receptive person. This must ultimately rest on some experience of the divine. For Christians, Jesus Christ is the window into ultimate reality. The recently emerging term Christpower refers to the transforming, regenerative influence available to humanity since Jesus Christ appeared in human history.

To conclude: science and religion are really complementary, each needs the other, but they should not improperly trespass on the other's territory, as has unfortunately occurred in the past.

Finally, from **Einstein:** "Science without religion is lame; religion without science is blind."

#### **GROUP'S NEWS**

#### North Ryde, Sydney:

On June 28th Michael Chester presented a talk titled The Interaction of the Soul and Body. The focus of the night were Swedenborg's experiences of the interaction of the soul and body published in Volume 8 of the Arcana Caelestia. These insights come under the title Influx and the Interaction of the Soul with the *Body*. It deals with the influx of the spiritual world into the natural world. There are 5 parts interspersed between Genesis 46-50 (n. 6053-6058, 6189-6215, 6307-6326, 6466-6495, 6598-6626). Two big ideas presented were Swedenborg's wholistic view of people with everything coming from the One Source and, secondly, the Lord governs man by means of spirits and angels. 21 people attended the presentation, many providing comments and questions resulting in a very informative and enjoyable evening.

On July 26th **Ruth Duckworth** presented a talk titled *Living for the Sake of Others* (a synopsis will appear in our next issue of *Candela*). She presented what true charity is, as outlined in Swedenborg's book *Charity: The Practice of Neighborliness*. There are 2 steps in practicing charity. Firstly, developing a pure intention by self-examination and repentance. And secondly, to do useful activity with the intention of serving the Lord. Ruth provided practical examples as she covered the different sections of the book. It was well received by the 20 people attending the presentation, with many providing comments and questions.

On August 16<sup>th</sup> the evening commenced with an Introduction by **Neville Jarvis** to the use of multimedia presentations at public meetings on Swedenborg''s spiritual philosophy. A keynote address by **Rev. Erik E. Sandstrom** (of the New Church in Bryn Athyn, USA), entitled *Swedenborg: Statesman and Revelator* followed. He provided many examples of Swedenborg's contemporaries becoming aware of his ability to move into the spiritual realms by the revelations he was able to share with them. His talk was followed by the **Annual General Meeting**. One of the highlights covered in the meeting was the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Association which will be commemorated with a special edition of the Candela Newsletter.

The 2002 Celebration of Spring on Friday 6th September was a very special event. About 60 people attended the evening, which began by voting on their choice for the 2002 Swedenborg prize for Spiritual Art. There were 20 entries to the Art Exhibition with the theme being Moulding the clay of the self. After a welcome by **John Brogan** the program began with the Peace Choir singing wonderful harmonics. Maryanne **Heslop**, a skilful potter, presented a talk focussing on why, in sacred writings, the metaphor of us being likened to clay and being moulded by the Divine Potter is worth consideration. She helped us appreciate the special qualities of clay and brought our attention to various correspondences that are instructions to us, on the need for inner purification and transformation by loving. This was followed by Marion Van Den Driesschen recalling her spontaneous responses to the Art entries before announcing the People's Choice on the evening, which went to Laura Riddell with her painting Exploration of Abundance. Lynne Heir then

recited a poem by Rumi. As she paused between verses, **Eileen Rees** read meanings to help us appreciate its message. **Julian Duckworth** dramatised a **Spring Invocation** that was good fun and well received. And **Laura Riddell** invited everyone to participate in a **Labyrinth walk** which was set up in the adjoining room. The evening concluded with people socializing and enjoying a delicious supper provided by **Louise Brogan**. There were many lovely passages accompanying the art works reminding us of Springtime renewal. Here is the passage that Laura provided with her winning entry.

Abundance seems to exist best in the internal world of Self, in the sacred relationship of communion with my Soul. It is here that abundance lives and thrives and IS a State of Being. When my soul is fed and feels whole, I exist in what I believe to be .. True Abundance and anything becomes possible.

### **Directors Profiles**

Continuing this series, we have brief autobiographical sketches for two more of our Directors to give members some idea of the "faces" behind these names. Thanks to John and Neville.

#### John Brogan

If they have a place in the spiritual world for architects I wish to go to that place. My joys in life are working with people to improve their situation and I seem to be unable to resist a challenge.

I'm always pottering about with building about the house or helping others with their jobs. I'm impatient with slow results so tend to be lacking in the finer detail. I don't like cleaning up after myself and have tools lying everywhere. There, I've admitted it, so let that be the end of that!

Louise and I were married five years ago and moved into a house which is surrounded by the Ku-ringgai National Park and Pittwater. We both work from home and have water-only access. It's not for everyone but we feel it is as close to heaven as one can get.

I have three off-spring (in their 30's) who have been very tolerant of their father's strange metamorphose from a conservative, predictable, breadwinner to being herbal and studying all these esoteric healing modalities. When my first wife was ill with advanced cancer I set out to find out about the body and the mind. I did courses in psychotherapy, remedial therapies, massage, kinesiology, Reiki, Physiology and Fung Shui and at about this time I came under the guidance of Dr Philip Groves. Dr Groves introduced me to Swedenborg and through the Writings my searching began to take a definite direction. What I had heard during my early Anglican lessons and reading started to make sense for the first time.

Dr Groves brought together three aspects of self-development. One was to increase knowledge in all of life's fields. Second was to develop the Self through the Gurdjieff teachings which leads naturally to the third aspect, that of spiritual growth through an understanding of the inner meanings of the Word through correspondences.

My present interests are in studying the linkages between The Ancient Church and the ancient Egyptian civilisation. Through the architecture of ancient peoples and relating correspondences to the built form I have found linkages from the present to the distant past. This is obviously very important to me because I spend the greater part of my life following this course.

I enjoy the contact through the Swedenborg Association with other people who have been stirred by the Writings. The diverse discussions and presentations when they share their journey are a continual delight for me.

"If you say that you only intend to stay for two years, you will be rejected!" These words, spoken by an Australian Embassy official at an interview in London on my application for a £10 migration, still ring in my ears 31 years later. Whilst some can detect an accent, most new people I come into contact with these days are unaware of my country of origin. But I am proud to be an Englishman, a freeman of my birth-town, and at the same time a naturalised Australian. I really did come to this country as a young chartered accountant expecting to move on after the mandatory 2 years but I now see the Lord had other plans for me. Would I have come had I known of them?

The Swedenborg movement has been part of my life from its beginnings; my mother was on duty as organist at a Sunday worship service just hours before I was born! So I am a 'Sundays child' - bright and blithe, and merry and gay, something on which I will not comment! Family connections can be traced back to the very early days of Swedenborg organisations in Britain. Has this helped me? I feel deeply grateful for having been imbued with such a positive, loving and rational approach to religion and life. But for me, experience has certainly taught that such a wonderful spiritual philosophy still does not simply 'work' for "those in the know". Spiritual knowledge still has to be taken into everyday life situations to become rooted in our soul, grow and give us direction. This is a process which never ceases; we clear one hill only to be challenged by the next. No easier for me than anyone else.

Not many days after setting foot in Melbourne, I was courting my wife, Alexis, also from a longstanding Swedenborgian family background. Within 11 months we were married. We have been blessed with three beautiful and talented daughters (one married, one working in UK, and the youngest about to enter the music teaching profession). Was it a quirk of fate that 20 years ago, I applied for the position to manage the Swedenborg Centre in Sydney, a significant change of career and family life upheaval? I am just thankful to have had the opportunity to be involved in the making of a small contribution to distribute and promote the precious teachings in Swedenborg's spiritual writings through the wider community, with administration being my forte.

Both at work and at home, I will often be seen with a screwdriver, hammer or such tool in my hand, perhaps up a ladder, as I set to as a Mr. Fixit. Being useful in this way gives me much satisfaction, as does gardening, dancing, singing and listening to music.

As one of first proponents of SAA, the achieving of 10 years is most heart-warming; I am sure the SAA will prosper going on to be of much more service to members and non-members alike.

### Remembering the Swedenborg Association of Australia Ltd. in your Will
